"Naxal" is a word that has come to be used to describe a terrorist who commits various acts of violence on behalf of the peasants, or landless farmers and labourers, and tribals, mostly against wealthy landlords, and bodies in the corporate world. According to the 'Naxalites', they are fighting a war to eventually create a society without any class or caste system. Chinese revolutionary Mao Zedong's aim was to encourage the poor peasants and low class tribals to fight against and overpower the government/s and the upper classes of people, and most people involved in the Naxal movements follow his aims and teachings. Naxalism today is present across 10 states of India. The most prominent areas of operation of the Naxalites are the lesser developed areas in the country. They operate mostly in rural areas, mostly from the jungles in these regions.

The Indian National Congress has made tremendous efforts in the war against Naxals, regardless of their ideology, but taking into consideration their violence. The Naxalites have been branded as terrorists and face resistance from most parts of the Indian political spectrum.
